All Saints' School, Youlgrave, continues to offer "good quality" education and is welcoming, supportive, progressive and safe, according to Ofsted which carried out its latest routine inspection of the school in February.

The formal verdict was that All Saints remains a "good" school and is making progress on all fronts, providing a rounded and effective education for all

children. The inspector's one-day visit included spending time with the children, staff, parents and governors. She observed lessons and checked school work, as well as holding detailed discussions with the Head Teacher, and concluded that the school has maintained the good quality of education since the last inspection four years ago.



## **Youlgrave School: Mental Health Matters**

Earlier this month we travelled to Lady Manners School to attend a training course to become Anti-Stigma Mental Health Ambassadors. On the course we learnt that looking after our mental health is as important as looking after our physical health. But unlike physical health, mental health problems are often not talked about due to fear of being 'seen' to be different.

Children from across all age groups (Y4-Y10) pledged to challenge this view and agreed to share, with their own schools and community, the message that looking after your mental health is important. We took part in several activities during the day; including learning how to street dance! We also learnt about the seven steps to mental wellbeing known as smilers, which are:

- Socialise: Get together with others
- Move: Be active
- Interest: Have a hobby, keep learning, do something creative
- Look: Take notice of the world around you
- · Eat well: Eat a balanced diet
- Rest: Relax, sleep well
- Support: Give help to others

We explored ways of starting conversations about mental health and how we could ask for help. We took

part in a number of competitions and several listening activities. We were informed about the national campaign called 'Be A Mate'. The key message of which is to be a mate you need to ask twice how someone is and to allow people the opportunity to talk about their feelings. ## Youlgrave School praised by Ofsted inspector

The inspector reported: "The school environment is bright and welcoming. Pupils, parents and governors speak proudly of the strong links the school has within the local community. Pupils' attitudes to learning are positive."

Once again the children were praised for being polite and courteous, and taking responsibility for set tasks. She was impressed by the way in which the community is involved in school life and activities; and with the school's popular Breakfast Club.

The inspector found that Governors and the Head Teacher were informed and monitoring pupil progress effectively, taking actions to address any perceived weaknesses or where pupils needed extra help. "In all the classrooms we visited, pupils were

proud of their work and tried hard with their handwriting and the general presentation of their work," the inspector wrote. She also praised the fact that safeguarding arrangements are "fit for purpose and fully meet requirements".

The report concluded that children were making effective progress across the school, and particularly now in Reception which was has been an area for improvement; but it encourages the school to keep monitoring progress and consider extra action as necessary to achieve good Key Stage 1 results.

Head Teacher Mrs Heather Stelling said she was delighted with the verdict on the school and it reflected the hard work and dedication of the "whole school family".

## The Fruit and Honey Garden Wakes Up

In the Peak District, at about 700ft, April is the month when the garden begins to wake up. After a long winter snoozing, it's time to stretch and yawn and – like the rest of us – look forward to breakfast. And like any parent, it is the gardener who has to prepare the food and make the bed.

If we want our offspring to be fruitful and multiply, we have to provide the right conditions: the spring is critical, preparation is all.

In the fruit garden the priority is to make sure weed competition is kept to

a minimum and food is provided in the form of compost: that plants are trimmed and ready. In the apiary we need to make sure that the bees still have some food left after months of living on stores, and that all our equipment is clean and ready for when it all becomes a 'hive of activity'!

April may not be the most exciting month, but it is definitely one of the most important. You can make your own garden a fruit and honey paradise, whatever its size, and we are here to help. If you come and work regularly in the garden you are entitled to a share of the crop. 
#### **Youlgrave Wildlife Notes: March 2019**

March has certainly lived up to its lion and lamb reputation for weather. We have had big storms causing flooding in the water meadows, bright and at times even mild weather and calm but often cool weather.


I did my first proper wildlife walk on the

24th. There were 17 wild flowers in bloom. I found only 11 at the same time last year. Many were one -offs. but the small cresses such as spring whitlow grass and hairy bitter cress were forming small carpets of tiny white flowers. Another of that group, wild garden rock cress, is decorating some of the walls and many of the local crags. Lesser celandine and king cups are giving a splash of yellow in grassland and by the river.

We have had one of the best months ever for birds of prey. The star was a brief visit by an osprey to the New Dam on the 12th. This bird did not appear on the bird watching sites, but one was recorded at Baslow a few days later. I saw one in Chatsworth Park on the 25th and that didn't appear either. There was a red kite above Alport on the 24th. plenty of buzzards, sparrowhawks in gardens with prey, the occasional peregrine and kestrel. Tawny owls have been hooting and hunting barn owls have been reported by several people. I had a couple of bramblings in the garden for most of the winter but not lately. Siskins are still very much around. There were four all fighting for position on the feeder recently. Greenfinches, chaffinches, goldfinches, bullfinches and tits including



village, with their lovely bubbling call, are one of my favourite signs of early spring. Woodpeckers have been drumming and visiting gardens. Mistle and song thrushes have been singing for a while now blackbirds. the probably my favourite garden songster, have joined n o w Chaffinches too are giving us their lovely descending scale with the flourish at the bottom.

There were about seven goosanders on the New Dam for a while and there was one female on the river recently. The kingfisher is still about, along with dippers, grey wagtails and a fairly tame heron. The cygnet is still around. Black fallow deer have been seen at Middleton and frogs and toads have been spawning and, sometimes fatally, crossing the road. The 28th was a good day for butterflies with comma, peacock and brimstone all on the wing.

## Youlgrave History Society – the story so far

We are a newly formed Society in the village. Some of you may already be aware of us, having seen and hopefully read our previous entries in the Bugle, maybe seen our posters on the village notice boards or met with us at the Village Hall spring and autumn fairs last year?

It all started back in February 2018 when an advert was placed in the Bugle by two of our long time village residents suggesting the formation of a group of enthusiastic village historians in order to collect, preserve, record and value the many old photos and memories that are around the village. There can be much delight in capturing recorded history so the call went out to come and share your thinking and maybe find answers to the "what shall we do with grandad's old photos" sort of questions. From this first advert interest has grown steadily, resulting in the creation of Youlgrave History Society.

We have been meeting informally





every month since then. It's a great social group with a nice mix of long time village residents and newer arrivals. Much tea and cake has been consumed in between getting involved in planning history projects. Last year we teamed up with the WEA to put on a course Researching Village History, which was well attended and a great success. In January, on a very sunny but cold day, we enjoyed an informative guided history walk around Youlgrave led by one of our very own and very knowledgeable History Society members (see photos). This was followed by a scrumptious and warming lunch at the Farmvard Inn.

In 2019 our Village Archive Project is set to really get going. We have been successful in being awarded an Action Grant from the Council to set up and run our village archive. We are currently in discussion with potential venues in the village to house the Archive, where it can be accessible to us all. From April we will be buying archive equipment and attending training courses delivered by the Archivists at Derbyshire Record Office so that we may learn how to set up and maintain our village archive properly. We have been lucky enough to have

quite a lot of village history material and books donated to us already, to be identified, catalogued and safely stored. If you have material or memories related to Youlgrave village and surrounding area that you would like us to record and archive please get in touch to find out more. We also hope to be able to offer an archiving service to other village clubs and societies if the need is there.

As well as the Archive, we are currently developing plans for a series of Village History Trails around the village and local area, which we hope will be of interest to residents and

visitors alike. The first of these will be available shortly. We are also working with the WEA again in the hope of putting on another village history related course later this year. Many other ideas for future projects and social events are also in the pipeline which we will reveal in the not too distant future!

#### PLEASE BE OBSERVANT - LOOK OUT FOR THE ASIAN HORNET

Some of you will have read reports of the expected invasion of the dreaded Asian hornet. These originated in China and spread to Europe. Unfortunately in France the first sightings were not taken seriously and it took only three years to reduce the French honey production to one third. They are carnivorous and prey on all insects but especially honeybees, wiping them out as they fly, starving the hive, then chomping on what's left.



These hornets can fly well over the 22 miles of the English Channel, but so far have been sighted coming via goods, crates and holiday cases. Four cases were spotted and treated last year. East Midlands is the second largest import, so we are as much at risk as the Dover coast. Asian Hornets are more aggressive and have a much stronger sting than any bee.

All UK beekeepers are learning and preparing to deal with them. We have a local team trained, set and ready. It is dangerous and complicated to rid a nest, so don't ever try yourself.

I am asking you to please look at the photos around the village, and on websites. Familiarise yourself with what they look like. Please study the normal European hornet as well, so you don't mistake it, as the European hornet is not a problem. **They are small, black with yellow legs, and orange face** (see picture above).

The other picture was taken in March this year with no livestock on the ground, only the ducks and swans enjoying the flood.

The cattle are all doing well in the nice dry sheds, very content as they are getting fat with the luxury of having their food constantly in front of them all the time and nice dry bedding. They are very quiet and will let you walk round stroking them. I think that this is partly due to the robot milking machine,

#### Recipe of the month: Tagliatelle in Seafood Sauce

Ingredients
4oz tagliatelle Verdi
knob of butter
1/2 pint white cooking sauce made with
1oz marg, 1/2 pt milk, 1oz flour
7oz prawns or mixed frozen fish pie
selection thawed
1/2 red pepper seeded and thinly sliced
salt and pepper
Parmesan cheese finely grated

#### Method

Cook the tagliatelle in boiling salted water for 7 mins and drain well and toss with butter. Simmer the white sauce and stir in the prawns, etc, and red pepper for 5 mins making sure that the fish is cooked well. Season well, pile the tagliatelle on a heated dish and pour the prawn and pepper sauce over. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Enjoy!

#### 100 years ago: NEWS FROM THE HOME FRONT

#### HIGH PEAK NEWS, April 1919 Easter 1919

"There were large congregations at the Parish Church on Easter Day. The Vicar occupied the pulpit at all services. Special Easter hymns were sung and Allen's Anthem 'Now, is Christ Risen from the Dead' was well rendered by the choir. The Church was heavily decorated with flowers

and the offertories, which amounted to over £11. will handed over to Rev. J G S Barclay, vicar of Shipton near Newark, who took duty when the local vicar, Rev. L W Greenshields was in the Army for six months, and also had a serious illness at Christmas time causing h i m considerable expense. There were 104 communicants at the Easter Service."

#### Easter Vestry Meeting

This was held at the Parish Church on Tuesday evening: the Vicar presenting the Church Warden's report showed the year had been exceptionally expensive in the matter of fuel and light, and the balance in hand was very small: 11s 11 ½d. He thanked all officers for their service during the year and appointed Mr Geo. Birds as his Warden. Mr John Dale was unanimously re-elected as people's Warden and the retiring sidemen were re-elected.

#### HIGH PEAK NEWS, April 5th 1919

"The Youlgreave Cinema has drawn crowded houses both last week and this, and some useful and amazing films have been presented to the audience." [Does the present Cinema Club have any records from this time?]

#### April 12th 1919

Parish Council Elections: For the seven

seats on Youlgreave Council there were ten candidates. including two ladies, neither of whom were however successful. Elected were: A b e 1 Boden 160: Arthur Marsden 156; Edwin James Evans 149; Frederick Gladstone Nuttall 125; George Edwin Bacon 107; George Edwin Frost 97; Harry Botham 82. Unsuccessful were: Ester Hannah Erington Oldfield 74; George Henry Ollerenshaw 68; Alice Sanders 38.



#### Returning Servicemen, April 1919

Amongst those being demobbed were: David Toft – Derbyshire Yeomanry 2nd April; Jack Brassington – Derbyshire Yeomanry 20th April; These had both landed in Egypt on 27th April 1915, David going on to spend 3 years and 5 months in Salonika. Walter Beebe – Royal Engineers 11th April – He died in May 1921 aged just 37 years. Wilfred Teesdale Shimwell – Agricultural Company Labour Corps.

The local press reported, "The boys

who have done their duty are gradually making their first appearance in civvies and settling down to their usual employment which they had before the War".

#### Derbyshire Times, 29th April 1919 Extra Sugar for Jam

Housewives wishing to obtain sugar for preserving soft fruit must send in their applications to the retailer today (Saturday). If the retailer should have no special forms for their signature applicants must state in writing the quantity they require and pledge themselves neither to use the sugar for purposes other than preserving fruit nor sell it to a third party.

#### High Peak News, 5th April 1919 Written Message from Australia

The Sydney correspondent of The Daily Telegraph states that much interest is being taken there in the Marconi Corporation's proposal to erect a high power station and establish a regular wireless service

between Australia and England. Successful tests have already been made with direct messages from a station at Wahroonga Sydney and Caernaryon, Wales.

#### Forthcoming Flight

Speaking at the annual meeting of the Royal Aero Club the Duke of Atholl said he had no doubt that success would attend the attempt at a transatlantic flight which would be made in a few months. It was a very important step in civil aviation although at the present time it might be regarded as a sporting event – brought about by Lord Northcliffe the vice-president of the Club. He hoped the laurels would be gained by a Britisher, and a British built machine with a British engine.
