So, with great gusto, eight members of the school choir spent their lunchtimes rehearsing a number of well-known and well-loved Christmas carols. When we discovered that the Chatsworth players were going to be visiting the village – normally only performing at the theatre in Chatsworth House – we wanted to make sure that we would be in keeping with the theme and occasion of the evening. So, with a bit of help from fellow teacher Mr Scully, we managed to borrow a set of cassocks and surplices from St Joesph's Church in Matlock to dress our choir members in.

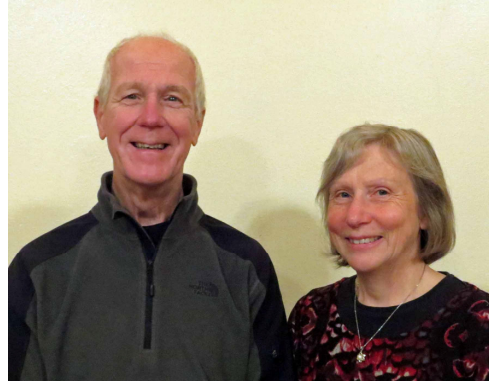

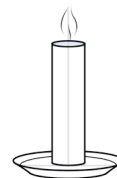

YOULGRAVE PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The October meeting of the Parish Council started with a 1 ½ hour rapid change of venue, owing to a hirer misunderstanding their booking at the Village Hall; but thanks to the Reading Room rapid response we were able to keep all parties happy by moving. Thanks also to the Village Hall Chair for standing outside to re-direct attendees – of which the meeting welcomed several.

Isabel Cogings, Derbyshire Dales District Council Rural Housing Enabler, informed Council of the process for a new Affordable Needs Housing Survey that will be posted through the door shortly. This confidential survey requires prospective applicants with a 10-year connection to this or adjoining parishes to submit personal information to enable an assessment of whether more houses are needed – and, if yes, how many. This is the first step in a long process, but it is essential to understand who wishes to live here but cannot afford open market housing, including those who have already been forced to move away. Parishioners are encouraged to pass the cards to anyone they know who may qualify, if they don't use them themselves. There will be extra cards available locally.

Applicants for two planning applications and an (early stage)

footpath diversion proposal discussed their proposals with Council before it went into session for formal discussion.

Council received reports from village organisations and heard back from Parishes Day, where the subjects of events and transport were debated at length, gathering the views from across the 125 parishes of the Peak District National Park.

A National Park Authority initiative for 'Village Statements' across every parish seeks to collect local information and in particular get local communities' own aspirations for the next few years that will help the Authority define its strategy for working with their communities.

The Coldwell End toilet block nears completion and awaits signing off by the Building Inspector. The work has been achieved within budget from Honest Box donations; and also thanks to an Awards for All grant and a special grant from our County Councillor Simon Spencer. Council has decided to formally open the block on Saturday 23rd November at 10:30am and all are welcome to attend.

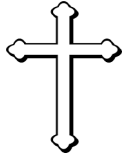

Churches in Youlgrave: Remembering

In the Church calendar, November is a month of remembering. It begins with All Saints and All Souls on 1st and 2nd November, traditionally times to remember those who have died. Like many churches, at Youlgrave we have an All Souls' service to remember our loved ones and light candles in their memory. The second Sunday of November is Remembrance Sunday, when we remember those whose lives have been lost, or changed forever, by the tragedy of war and conflict. Finally at the end of the month, just before Advent begins, we celebrate Christ the King.

For me, as a Christian, our celebration of Christ the King puts all of our remembering into perspective. We celebrate that Christ was a King like no other, a King who came to show us how much God loves us all, and to teach us how to truly love. A King who chose to be die, because he would not take any action to harm those who sought to kill him. A King who came to teach that true kingship, true greatness, lies only in serving others, only in seeking their well-being above all else.

So it is through Christ, my King, that the pain of human grief is eased, as I remember how God's love for us is greater than both life and death, and nothing can separate us from God's love. And it is through Christ, my King, that I believe that Remembrance Sunday can only have any real meaning if it is an occasion for repentance for our part in all that causes division and conflict, and a time to recommit ourselves to be those who always seek reconciliation. And I believe that is possible, because I believe love to be the only power on earth that can overcome evil.

News from Youlgrave All Saints' CE Primary School

A visit to Bakewell Market with Class 3

Our topic in Key Stage 2 this half term has been farming and in Class 3 we've also been looking at Fair Trade and supporting local business. With this in mind we decided to take a trip on Monday 14th October to Bakewell Market.

Much excitement ensued in class as we all donned our hi-vis jackets. We knew it was going to be busy and Mrs Prince wanted to be able to keep an eye on all 22 children – and with our packed lunches in hand we set off for the bus stop outside The George. As the Hulley's bus pulled up there was a moment of trepidation amongst all as we realised that, being Monday, the bus was quite full. However, with a little 'London like' mentality we all crammed onto the local service bus and headed into town.

Arriving in Bakewell, we headed over the bridges and into the foyer of the Agricultural Centre where we had arranged to meet one of our parents, Mr Harrop, who was going to show us around. Our first point of call was the



cattle auction. Still in hi-vis, we bustled through the crowd and up on to the top of the viewing platform where Mr Harrop explained to us that the screen showed us the weight of the animal and the bids were pence per kilo – so lots of maths skills needed here to work out how much you were paying for your cow! Next, we travelled through the shoe-dip and into the calf and sheep pens. We learnt that all of the animals were weighed on their way into the pens and were then being sold and bought by the little gaggle of people who were moving around then pens. We decided it was probably time to move on before we found ourselves inadvertently buying some sheep to take back to school!

After a quick toilet stop, we headed into the offices where we learnt that all of the animals being bought and sold had their own passports. It was quite a revelation to see all of the paperwork involved in farming and made us realise that being

organised was a key part of the trade.

Our final stop at the market was back in the cattle auction where we learnt that some of the animals being sold were heading for the butchers, whereas others would be taken back to farms for breeding and feeding up. It really was an exciting and enlightening visit and we'd like to say thanks again to Mr Harrop for showing us around.

Following our farming experience, we went into the Bakewell Co-op store where we had arranged to go on a Fair Trade tour of the store. We were taken to an upstairs room where we left our bags and coats and were introduced to the concept of Fair Trade – farmers getting a fair price for the produce they sell – and learnt that the Fair Trade organisation has now been around for 25 years. After going around the store and filling our baskets with lots of Fair Trade products – from flowers and ice-cream to chocolate and iced coffee – we then got to have a backstage tour of

the store. We visited the warehouse, the bakery, fridges and freezers and even the manager's office where we got to look at the CCTV images around the store.

After a quick pit-stop for lunch, we had a brief march around the market where we saw some of the local produce on sale to the public. We even saw a relative of one of our pupils selling her potted meat and we were each given a sample to taste (we highly recommend her duck and orange and the good old original potted beef!).

At the end of a busy afternoon we headed over to Stand B outside Bakewell's Bath Gardens and caught the local bus back to school again and the bus driver very kindly dropped us right outside the school gate – which as lucky because we were all worn out after our day exploring Bakewell as Class 3.

Class 1 and Class 2 visit to a local farm

Children from Youlgrave School enjoyed a day out at a local farm on Wednesday 23rd October. The visit was arranged as part of the children's topic in school which was 'farming'. The children enjoyed a woodland walk all the way to Shimwell's Farm, taking in the beautiful countryside on the way.

Dakin and Sarah Shimwell were wonderful hosts and showed the children about day to day life on a working dairy farm. The children saw how the cows were milked and fed as well as looking at the farm equipment used by Mr Shimwell. The school would like to thank Dakin and Sarah for providing such a superb learning visit for our children.

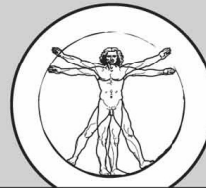

Youlgrave Wildlife Notes: October 2019

It is the 26th October. It has been raining heavily for 24 hours. The leaves are falling and Alport Dale was flooded this morning. On the brighter side the forecast is good for the rest of the month.

My pre-article walk found 26 species of wildflower in bloom, including the persistent ivy leafed toadflax on the walls and the rare spring sandwort on the spoil heaps. One or two spring flowers such as hairy bittercress and spring whitlow grass could also be found, apparently confused by our strange weather.

There were lots of fungi, some of which we managed to identify, such as common ink cap, shaggy ink cap, egg yolk fungus, sulphur tuft and candle snuff. A few years ago there was an eruption of nasty white stuff on the grass in the fields. This was dog vomit slime mould, which

describes it rather well, and we seem to have some this year. Slime moulds were originally classified as fungi but are now classified in the Protista, which includes things like amoeba and are normally present in the soil as single cells. These move around feeding on bacteria and similar things. Sometimes they congregate into masses and these are the ones we can see. Even more simple than slime moulds I have found star jelly (*Nostoc commune*) recently. This appears as a blob of greenish brown jelly growing, in this case, on a wall. It belongs to a group called the blue green bacteria, formally algae, which were some of the earliest living things on earth. Because they can photosynthesize and split water releasing oxygen it is

thought they changed the early earth's atmosphere so it contained the free oxygen which we now use to breathe.

Our winter visiting birds such as fieldfare and redwing are certainly in the area, but I haven't heard of any actually feeding in the village yet. There seem to be fewer blackbirds than last year, so there are a lot of berries left for them. Our holly and cotoneaster are laden. There were a couple of pink footed geese with the greylags on the New Dam on the 17th.

Nuthatches are now visiting garden feeders again and we have had several bullfinches. A rare treat was a goldcrest in a yew outside our lounge window.

There have been goosanders both on the New Dam and the river. Dippers have been quite common on the river along with a dabchick, grey

wagtail, pied wagtail and a remarkably tame heron. Our cygnet is almost a mature swan now, lacking only its orange beak.

Left over from summer, a few late swallows and house martins were reported at the beginning of the month and two hedgehogs were still being fed above Alport. Hopefully these will have hibernated by now. A barn owl was seen early in the month and tawny owls have been calling.

Recipe of the Month: Cherry and Vanilla Custard Tart

Ingredients

Short crust pastry to line a 20cm tart tin

4 Egg yolks

75 g caster sugar

250ml double cream

1tsp vanilla extract

40g can black cherries drained

Nutmeg to grate on top

Method

Line the flan dish with the pastry and line with baking parchment and baking beans and cook blind for about 20 mins. Remove the beans and cook for another 5 mins.

In a large mixing bowl whisk together the egg yolks and sugar then whisk in the cream and vanilla extract. Scatter the drained cherries into the tart case and pour over the cream mixture. Grate the nutmeg over the top and then bake in the oven for about 45 mins until set with

a little wobble in the centre, cool at room temperature or chill overnight.

If you prefer you can replace the cherries with your choice of fruit.
