An invitation to fish at Youlgrave Dam

You can find the pond by walking down past the church, crossing the river and turning directly left. It's up the farm drive, just out of sight. The fishing rights have been leased out for 50 years, but this year sees them brought back inhand by Haddon Estate to encourage local participation.

We would like to see the younger residents fishing the pond. Children will not have to pay to fish, although they must ask for a ticket in Youlgrave Post Office before going.

Although the pond is very shallow, it is silty, so we insist adults keep an eye on young anglers. The trick is not to stay too long. The fish are easy to catch and there is no need for children to have fancy

tackle. Cut a long, straight, thin branch or acquire a garden cane. Tie some string to the end and attach some fine fishing line. Add a float; one can be made from a large feather, a hook without a barb and some small weights to cock the float. Maggots can be bought from two shops in Chesterfield and are best stored in the fridge, next to the butter, in bait boxes with plenty of

holes. Your Mum will be OK with this as it's getting you out from in front of your computer.

Set your float to fish 40cm and cast it a little way out. Throw a pinch of maggots at the float every five minutes, no more.

> The pond holds billions of young perch, which have stripes and are rough on their sides. It also has plenty of bream which are known 'Snots' as obvious reasons. You might also be lucky to catch a roach with its red Unhook the fish fins. carefully and slip them back. Try and get someone to photograph your first fish; it's always nice to look back. On hot days you will see some massive fish

swimming just under the surface. These are carp and are best left until you have plenty of experience as they are very powerful and may pull you in!

Report from Youlgrave Parish Council

June's meeting of the Parish Council supported two planning applications and received its annual allotment inspection report – we still have vacancies. Thanks were expressed to our District Councillor, Graham Elliott, who has provided a grant to pay for a noticeboard for allotment holders which will be erected in their car park. Council forward planning is looking to a joint project with Highways to improve awareness at Coldwell End for traffic and reduce vehicle speed. Following discussions with our footballers and cricketers we will be seeking grants to modernise the shower/toilet facilities in the pavilion next year. You will see 'no parking' cones placed on Alport Lane from early until 3.30pm on Thursday 12th July as an inter primary school rounders tournament is being held on the Playing Fields – this is the smaller event that went unnoticed last year, but to ensure traffic flow Council has arranged to provide this service. On 14th July Marie Curie have hired the top of the field to provide car parking for a sponsored walk based from Youlgrave (they are also using the Village Hall) and Council is grateful to Youlgrave Lodge CC for only playing on Sunday that weekend. YUFC is playing a charity match on 22nd July to raise money for Ashgate Hospice. Our defibrillators are all now in their final stage of life with your funds having paid £1,000 to get all four units new batteries, which will give them another three years life span. The remaining monies will go towards the next generation, although we will need to seek further donations to replace them all at that time.

Women's Footprints – Manchester and Youlgrave

Middleton along the dale was almost dreamlike; the hum of insects, a rare dark green fritillary fluttering over the water thick with the white flowers of water crowsfoot, a sleeping clutch of ducklings on the

waters edge and over it all two buzzards calling above the trees in the cloudless sky.

Youlgrave in all its glory; spelt out for me, as if I didn't know, by a visit to our Well Dressings by a group of mainly Muslim women and children – African, Algerian, Asian, Caribbean background – all from Manchester. A million miles away from the world we are lucky

And so to their Sunday visit in Well Dressing week: a triumph! There was great support from the women of the village and as a result, we were able to provide our guests with a sumptuous vegetarian lunch with spectacular home made cakes. Then a walk through a pretty, quiet village (it was the World Cup) to view the Well Dressings before joining in a Muslim and Christian prayer at the top well. All the Wells this year focused in different ways on peace - or

enough to experience in Youlgrave.

our destruction of the earth. None of our group had ever seen Well Dressings before and were fascinated by the designs and the amount of work that had gone in to create them.

We then all went down to the river

where all the children couldn't wait to get in the water! Off with the Eid dresses scarves and in they went! Our local Brownies were great hosts and 10-yearold Billy proved a willing teacher and

told them all about the water creatures they found in their fishing nets. The excitement at discovering water shrimps could only have been rivaled by finding a crocodile in the river!

Then back to the Reading Room for more tea and cakes and huge "thank you's" from all our guests. It couldn't have been better!

But the comment I shall remember from one woman as she gazed out over the dale: "Do you think it could be possible for me to live here?" I had said the same thing 25 years ago. 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David Rhodes (1949-2018)

David was born in Youlgrave on 27 September 1949, son of Eva and Tom Rhodes. He had three brothers and three sisters: Adrian, Hilary, Steven, Davina, Desmond and Valerie. He went to school at Youlgrave Infants and Junior School and then moved on to Bakewell Boys School.

David and Muriel started courting on in 1966. Two years later they got engaged

and in 1973 they were married at Bakewell Parish Church. They had two sons, Philip who was born in 1980 and James who was born in 1981.

David started work at Jimmy Halls in Youlgrave and had several jobs before he went to work for Derbyshire Dales District Council. David was given a six months contract; he stayed there for 34 years until he took early retirement as Northern Area Supervisor aged 57. He loved his time on the council and worked

with so many lovely people, making lifelong friends.

David loved sport. He played football for Youlgrave and Bakewell, being made captain of Bakewell. In later years he was chairman of Bakewell FC. He also ran the junior teams at Bakewell. In addition, David loved music and had a very varied collection. He and Muriel loved going to shows and saw many groups and musicals.

His football love was Chesterfield, where he was a regular season ticket holder, followed by Wolves. He and Muriel also spent many happy years watching Sheffield United where again

they made some great friends.

In the 1980s David ran the Nottingham marathon twice, his times being three hours 10 minutes and then and 3 hours 20 minutes. He also loved walking and cycling and would go off on both for many miles.

David's humour was well known and he was always making people laugh. He was a regular in Bakewell Carnival for

many years. People just used to love watching him and he loved to entertain them and make them smile. In later years he became a Trustee on the Bakewell Carnival Trust Committee.

David loved to meet people and would talk to anybody and everybody. He was the easiest person to talk to and be around. He had a knack of putting people at their ease and enjoying conversations. He was also someone who would do anything for anybody.

Muriel, Philip and James would like to thank everyone who visited David during his illness or telephoned him. He really appreciated it and enjoyed seeing everybody. They would also like to thank people for all the lovely cards and flowers.

Youlgrave Wildlife Notes: June

Perhaps the most exciting news this month has been reports of water vole right through the month. This is one of Britain's most endangered species, so we can only hope that there are more than one and they breed. Hares, too, have been well reported and I assume at least some of these will be this year's young.

Birds have also provided plenty of excitement. Red kites have been seen in the area since the 10th. They have not gone unnoticed by our resident birds and a peregrine was seen mobbing one on the 17th (my last report). A young

peregrine was also seen in the Dale. A barn owl has been Moor seen round Lane and over the Lathkill near Raper Lodge. Kestrels have been seen, but I have had no evidence of sparrowhawks this month. Along the river dippers have been

seen, including young ones and the occasional heron. Grey wagtails have been breeding. There was a nest near the bottom of Braemar Lanes that was damaged, but perhaps the young fledged? I certainly saw young grey wagtails further up near the dams.


Redstarts have bred down Conksbury Lane and near the New Dam where I managed to get a very distant photo of the male to avoid disturbing them. On garden feeders all the finches, including bullfinch, have been visiting and a nuthatch has returned to Holywell Lane. Woodpeckers, too, have returned to gardens. We have had a regular visitor for much of the month. A siskin was seen on our garden feeders after an absence of several months. Fledgling birds have been common. Blue tits, sparrows, green finches, blackbirds and thrushes have all been seen, often begging for food from their overworked parents.

The week beginning Monday 16th was UK Swift Awareness Week. I would much appreciate records of swift nests around Youlgrave to contribute to the knowledge of this threatened species. Apparently they have been scarce this year at Alport. I did try to count flying birds over the Dale and managed about 20, though nests would be a lot easier.

A cinnabar moth was reported. These

have the vellow and black striped caterpillars found on ragwort.

About 60 species of wildflowers are in bloom at the moment. crowfoot giving a spectacular of white. floating on the river

> I have previously mentioned the common spotted orchids growing in my carefully neglected lawn. I had marked and trimmed round the ones I knew about but others have appeared that I had no idea were there. My total count now looks to be 25 flowers guite widely distributed over the lawn.

Church Farm Diary, July 2018

In the 1920–30s my Grandfather, Arthur Wardle, had a taxi business in Youlgrave. He started out with horses, using black horses for funerals and white ones for weddings. Later on, when motor cars arrived, he had the first taxi business in the village, fetching people from the railway station at Bakewell and Buxton. Sadly he died in his 40s, leaving a young widow and four children,



in his 40s, leaving a young Arthur Wardle's Youlgrave taxi service.

one of which was my father who was then taken under the wing of Great Uncle Tom and Uncle Tom's sister Auntie Clara.

They also ran a shop at Church Farm selling everything you could think of, as did many shops in Youlgrave, some of them from the front rooms of many houses. I can't remember Uncle Tom's shop when it was working, only playing in it after it had shut. The picture is of my grandfather Arthur in the tax.

The weather is unusually hot and dry after the long wet winter. We didn't seem to

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have any spring before the summer arrived. I guess you will know what I am going to say next – please can we have some rain? The grass is getting burnt and what grass that has grown is now going back. Many farmers are getting worried about the fodder because the cattle that are grazing outside will have to be fed with this year's crops, leaving no fodder for the winter if things don't improve.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH:

Coconut and Stem Ginger Macaroons

Ingredients

5 egg white

2 tbsp caster sugar

1 tbsp honey

1 tbsp stem ginger chopped very finely

150g desiccated coconut

2 tbsp plain flour

Method

Preheat the oven to gas 3 / fan 140 Place the egg white in a bowl and whisk until frothy, then add the sugar, honey, stem ginger, coconut and flour and mix it all together until you have a sticky, quite wet mixture. Divide the mixture into 14 equal size

pieces. I find the best way to do this is making your hands a little bit wet, then roll the piece unto a ball and squidging it into a pyramid shape.

When you have formed each macaroon place onto a lined baking sheet.

Bake for about 20 mins or until they are golden brown but are still nice and soft inside.

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100 years ago: NEWS FROM THE HOME FRONT

Derbyshire Times 31 August 1918 - Youlgreave Officer Wounded

Captain Charles Waterhouse of Lomberdale Hall has been slightly wounded in the left shoulder, arm and wrist and is at present home on leave. Charles, born 1 July 1893, was the eldest of four sons of Thomas Crompton and Sarah Waterhouse. He served initially as a Second Lieutenant with the 1st Lifeguards, as part of the British Expeditionary force arriving in France and Flanders in 1914. Their visit to Ypres was on October en route to Menin. It was during their time at Ypres during 1914-1915 that Charles salved the fragments of stained glass from the war-damaged St Martin's Cathedral and other Ypres churches. With the permission of relevant Belgian authorities he brought back the glass which was eventually to form part of the unique stained-glass memorial window to his brother Rennie, Captain Lancashire Fusiliers, killed in action at Gallipoli 7 May 1915.

Charles was later promoted to Captain and served in the Tank Corps. After the War, during which he was awarded the Military Cross, he was elected MP for Leicester South 1924-1945. He was a Privy Councillor in 1944 and was reelected MP to Leicester South East from 1950 to 1957.

Youlgreave to Ypres

Thank you to the Welldressing Group and to the Methodist Chapel for allowing us to



display three of the four quadrant panels which will form part of the centenary memorial and which were very well received.

We are planning to have the completed piece on display in All Saints' Church in late July prior to being transported to Belgium for the presentation on Sunday 19 August. SEE VILLAGE NOTICEBOARDS FOR EXACT DATES.

Its design is such that it can be split into two halves, with one half returning to All Saints' Church – the two pieces can then be interchanged over the coming years to perpetuate our unique link with Ypres.

Hundreds, or more likely thousands, of hours of work have been voluntarily devoted to this project and we are grateful for the Youlgreave community spirit and skills which have gone into creating it.

We thank all those individuals and local companies who have kindly donated towards the piece but we are still a little short – if you would like to make a contribution it would be much appreciated.

High Peak News, Saturday August 10th 1918 - EGGS

We are pleased to announce that during the month of July (1918) 305 eggs were sent from Youlgreave to the Red Cross Hospital at Bakewell. To those who so generously help in this most deserving object it would be gratifying to know that since 1915 the number of eggs sent from Youlgreave, Harthill and Alport

is 18,439.

Thursday 8th August 1918

On this day the Allied Forces on the Western Front launched a surprise attack that heralded the end of the First World War. After some four months of withstanding the ferocious German attacks the tables were turned and the Allied Forces went on to secure the victory that was to come 100 days later with the Armistice on 11th November.

AN ECLECTIC MIX OF OVER 20 FOOD & DRINK STALLS On the playing fields
