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





Town Hall update from District Councillor, Laura Mellstrom



make any significant service cuts but, looking ahead. without more from central government, there will be a shortfall of about £1.1m for 2025/26 and £2.6m 2026/27. in Forecasting difficult because central government grants are currently only announced at the last minute, for one year at a time.

District Council Budget 2024-25

March is budget time not just for national government but also for local councils. Even the national press is starting to catch on to the crisis in local government funding, with more and more authorities declaring that they can no longer provide even core services on the funding available.

The District Council should receive £23.6m in the coming year, funded from Fees and charges, Council Government Business Rates, and Grants, in the proportions shown in the illustration (right). Fees and charges include things like Council car parks, and the green bin garden waste service which has just gone up to £56 per year after being frozen at £50 for 3 years. (This is still slightly less than it costs the Council to recycle the green waste, so that the service is partly subsidised from other income sources.)

The District Council has balanced its budget for 2024/25 without needing to

Council Tax

The Council voted on 29 February to increase the part of Council Tax that goes to DDDC by 2.99%. This is the maximum increase allowed, and represents £6.88 for an average Band D property. However this is not the whole story. The District Council only keeps 11% of Council Tax revenue. Council Tax bills will be going up by a bit more than this because they include not only the District Council's money, but also County Council, Police, Fire Service and Parish Council precepts.

The amount of the Parish Precept varies between parishes and is set by the Parish Council. The highest is Ashford in the Water at £130.37 for a Band D house, and the lowest is £2.18 in Snelston. The average is £67.34. Youlgrave is at the low end with £53.13.

Double Council Tax on Second Homes from April 25

Approximately 8.4% of homes within the Dales are not being used as a

main residence. That is the average, so the figure will be higher in the Peak villages. Most of them are in Bands B, C and D, ie the smaller homes in the District. The Government has finally passed the Levelling Up legislation which allows councils to charge additional Council Tax on second homes, and the District Council has voted to do this by the full 100% allowed, with effect from next year. This is due to the concern in many parts of the Dales that popular areas are in danger of becoming ghost villages. In last year's public consultation, 63% of respondents supported the double rate for second homes.

There will be further discussion of possible exemptions before it comes into force, and the intention is that the funds raised will be ringfenced for the provision of affordable housing in the area. This does not affect holiday lets if they are registered for Business Rates. Please get in touch If there's anything you would like to discuss.

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Chair's Annual Report, Middleton & Smerrill Parish Council

It has been an eventful year with some very positive developments and also some challenges provided by the wet and stormy weather. The deterioration in the state of local roads and pavements has been a continuing cause for concern. There have been regular reports of potholes requiring repairs; a new village name sign has been requested for the Smerrill entrance to the village.

Litter has been less of a problem since the substantial collection of 80 bags was made in 2022. Volunteers regularly remove litter from the centre of the village and a major litter-pick takes place on the surrounding roads and paths each year in March.

Blocked drains have cause localised flooding on some roads. DCC has been asked to clear gulley leaf blockages in The Rakes; and to remove leaves from roads and pavements when autumn leaffall is over. The drain at the triangle by the entrance to the Dale was completely blocked after recent storms and was cleared by Jamie Wigley.

Storm damage in December resulted in falling branches from two of the large trees in private gardens in the Square. No personal injuries were sustained, but a parked car belonging to a local resident was written off due to damage caused by a fallen branch.

The protracted work to improve the sewers in the Dale has caused significant disruption to the paths over the last few weeks. The information board at Bateman's tomb sustained some weather damage again this year but has been repaired. The pathway up to the tomb was improved last year. The area inside the railings around the tomb is regularly weeded and the pathway is mown and strimmed to ensure access for visitors.

The Middleton memorial trees (a beech tree for the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II, and crab apple tree for the coronation of King Charles III), on the approach to Bateman's tomb, have been

cared for and are growing well. Both trees are to be recorded and mapped as part of the Million Trees project.

The defibrillator in the telephone box in the Square has been regularly checked and new pads/batteries replaced.

DDDC is currently undertaking a public toilets review: District Councillor Laura Mellstrom supports our aim to have the Middleton toilets open all year and has asked DDDC to consider this option.

The Parish Council Climate and Nature Group has continued to meet weekly to maintain and improve the environment. A 'scented garden' area has been created adjacent to the shed in the playground. Additional snowdrops and daffodils were planted in the grass border at the side of the playground. The community herb garden is well-established in the Picnic Garden and the borders in that area now contain a variety of bulbs, flowers and shrubs which provide seasonal displays. The village planter is regularly renewed so that it is always attractive and since the removal of the dilapidated trailer from outside the Tor Farm wall there is a new wildflower area being developed. There is also a focus on supporting local wildlife. Middleton now has a thriving population of hedgehogs. Several residents provide suitable food, water and shelter for these

endangered creatures. It seems that the hedgehogs had a very successful year. There were numerous sightings, night-time video captures and reports of litters of baby hedgehogs being successfully reared. Purpose-built and naturally occurring shelters helped to support them. Efforts to alert motorists to their presence will continue and we hope that it will avoid fatalities this year.

Council regularly discusses planning applications and in line with our aspirations for the parish there is a preference for planning developments which would provide housing for permanent residents and affordable housing options. This year an application to convert historic barns into holiday lets was supported because it will preserve heritage buildings and also protect wildlife, notably a population of bats.

The parish council has raised grant funding to support improvements to the facilities in the area behind the Village Hall which is owned by the parish council. Some of the work to clear the site was started last year. Volunteers worked hard to clear the weeds and debris that had accumulated there. The old toilet block building has been re-roofed to make it safe and weatherproof. New doors have been fitted to ensure it is secure. It is intended that the renovated block will be put to community use, such as a storage facility in the first instance. A grant from County Councillor Simon Spencer was used to fund work on the toilet block. Another exciting development behind the Village Hall is the greenhouse for community use. The greenhouse is being built by the parish council's Climate and Nature sub-committee with help from other volunteers. This large greenhouse will be used to grow plants for the annual stall at the village market in May and will also be available for use by local residents. The greenhouse was funded by a grant from the Community Lottery Fund.

Additional items for the gardening work (two child-safe water butts and a heavy duty wheelbarrow) were grant funded

from Cllr Mellstrom's Local Project's fund.

The popular children's playground has also been improved in addition to the

also been improved. In addition to the new picnic tables, swings and exercise equipment installed last year, the playground has been resurfaced to remove the badly damaged tarmac.

The parish council receives regular reports from the Village Hall committee, some of whose members have also been actively involved in supporting the construction of the greenhouse and the development of the area behind the hall. The VH committee has invited the parish council Climate and Nature group to submit a proposal to support further the greenhouse and garden initiatives for community benefit. In order to strengthen the community's case for ownership in the future, the parish council has now the acquired 'Community Asset' designation for the Village Hall from DDDC. This assists the community's case for eventual ownership of the hall.

I would like to express my thanks to the members of the Parish Council, the Climate and Nature Group and members of the Village Hall Committee for all their work in supporting our community by giving their time, energy, offers of materials, transport and more.

Thanks also to our financial supporters this year — Cllr Laura Mellstrom, Cllr Simon Spencer, the National Lottery Community Fund. Thanks to PCSO Anthony Boswell for his regular reports to PC meetings. My special thanks to our PC clerk Matthew Lovell who provides all the essential support to ensure that the Parish Council can work effectively, has succeeded in obtaining the grant funding, and is always available to give advice and share his knowledge and experience.

It is very heartening to have so many people in the parish who are committed to preserving, developing and improving our local facilities and environment for everyone who lives here, or comes here as a visitor, to enjoy.

YHA in the Youlgrave area: A short history

Long before the former Co-op Stores on Fountain Square became a youth hostel the YHA already had a presence in the Youlgrave area.

Youlgrave's first youth hostel was established at Newlands on Alport Lane as far back as 1934 (just 4 years after YHA itself was founded). The YHA's *Rucksack* magazine of Summer 1934 had this description:

"Newlands, Youlgreave (warden, Miss Trueman) is a delightful stone house at the entrance to this fascinating and interesting old-world village. The hostel overlooks the extensive village playing fields beyond which is the beautiful Bradford Dale, and behind it is the farfamed Lathkill Dale. Not far away is the Derbyshire 'Stonehenge' at Arbor Low. The hostel is provided primarily to break the long tramps between Hartington Hall, Overton Hall, and Derwent Hall. It begins with 16 beds."

However, by 1936 Newlands had ceased operating as a youth hostel, one of several of North Midlands Region's smaller adopted hostels that closed in favour of fully regulated additions.

Lathkill Dale and Elton youth hostels In place of the short-lived hostel at Newlands came Lathkill Dale Youth

Hostel, which was open between 1939 and 1942. It occupied Conksbury Old Hall, about a mile out of the village off Back Lane. Conksbury Old Hall is a Grade II listed building dating from the early 18th century. Mavis Burton of Derby was a regular hosteller in the Peak District in the 1940s and recalled her visits: "My first hostelling weekend was spent with Mary at Conksbury which had been a farmhouse in Lathkill Dale. Now it has reverted back to a private house. The beds were top and bottom bunks. We were always broke so we took our own food and cooked in the 'self-cookers' - it was cheaper. The toilet was across a field. Washing facilities were a little sketchy, a row of enamel bowls on wooden benches.

After supper we decided to go to the nearest village, Youlgreave, for a drink at the local. The village was supposed to be blacked out. True to say all the shutters were in place but they were so badly fitting that, in the surrounding darkness, Youlgreave shone forth like a beacon. Small wonder that one night a bomb, dropped close by, it brought down the hostel ceilings."

As Conksbury Old Hall was closing so YHA opened a hostel at Elton Old Hall, off the village main street in Elton. This equally impressive 17th century building began taking guests in 1942 and remained a YHA hostel until as recently as 2003.

Youlgrave youth hostel

In 1974 YHA purchased the former village Co-op stores on Youlgrave's Fountain Square for the princely sum of £6,000. They then spent a further £30,000 converting it to a 48-bed youth hostel.

The village's Co-operative Society was formed in 1870 by Joseph Shimwell of Old Hall Farm, Tom Birds of Hall Farm and Joseph Smith. An ambitious Co-operative department store followed in 1887, comprising three storeys plus basement, built on the steeply sloping site of the original village school of 1762. The shop catered to much of the local population's needs. It also purchased instruments for the village brass (later silver) band and displayed them in the shop window shortly after opening.

The Society even supplied the village with electricity from 1910 until the nationalisation of the industry. In 1926 the Co-operative committed to supply ordered drapery and boots, and groceries and provisions of the best quality. Tinned fruit and jam were a speciality. By the 1920s, the controlling body was the Derwent Valley Co-operative Society Ltd, with branches at Youlgrave, Rowsley and Two Dales. Members were permitted to receive goods on credit, paying for them when circumstances improved.

In World War II incendiary bombs caused considerable damage in the

village. One such device slid down the ramp towards the basement of the Coop and was kicked away by a guest from the Bull's Head!

Youlgrave Co-op finally ceased trading and closed its doors in 1968. Dave Allison, the Regional Manager for YHA's Peak District, describes how Harry Camm, a coach operator and developer, had bought the Youlgrave Co-operative Department Store when the Society was wound up in 1964.

The hostel was finally up and running in 1975 and has welcomed thousands of guests ever since. Managers have included Jon Cant, Debby Oley and John Tory, all still familiar faces in the village. Over the years there have been modernisations, of course. Gone are the linoleum floors, formica tables and large dormitories and now there are small and comfortable en-suite rooms.

In 2021 Youlgrave Youth Hostel was purchased by Colin Trigg under YHA's Enterprise scheme, but it remains a YHA hostel and very much part of the nationwide network. However, Colin's ongoing investment has seen an artisan bakery and coffee shop open at the hostel. And so the next chapter begins...





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Youlgrave Wildlife Notes: March 2024

Spring is slowly arriving. At last, our first spring warbler, the chiffchaff, has arrived and has been chiff chaffing merrily down Holywell Lane and a Daleside garden.

Frogs have been depositing loads of spawn in garden ponds and newts have been doing their courtship dance. Most of our newts are smooth newts, but great crested newts have been photographed. This is the first time I have recorded crested newts from Youlgrave.

A bird that visits us at this time of year on its way to its nesting grounds is the curlew and there have been up to

17 flying over the village and feeding in the fields beside the New Dam. Their liquid warble has given pleasure to a lot of people. Other bird songs are only just getting going. Song thrushes have been belting it out from the treetops, chaffinches, robins, dunnocks and great tits can all be heard Sparrowhawk (photo by Geoff Clay). and are fairly easy to

identify. A blackbird has just begun singing in our garden. Blue tits have been inspecting nest boxes. Apart from buzzards, sparrowhawks and red kites have been the main bird of prey interest. Kites are flying over the village most days. There have been several reports of sparrowhawks. One was watched for over 20 minutes as it slowly pulled its pigeon prey apart. Another landed on some decking then got rather confused by the glass surround and took a while to find its way out. It then sat on top of the bird feeder. Not a very bright bird. We had a large pile of wood pigeon feathers on

our lawn.

A barn owl was seen at the top of Moor Lane. Goosanders have been reported on the New Dam and river. Mandarin ducks, teal and a male tufted duck along with both Canada and greylag geese have all been on the New Dam. Dippers have been rather scarce along the river though a pair were seen displaying down at Alport. A heron was seen with a fish. Other notable birds have been nuthatch, grey and pied wagtails, meadow pipits and skylarks. We have lots of finches, greenfinch, chaffinch, siskin goldfinch on our feeders which they are emptying very quickly.

> On my wildlife walk on 21st March I found 15 species of wildflowers in bloom. This compares with 13 in March 2023 with a similar species list. Kingcups and lesser celandines were very obvious and obvious were our four tiny white flowers, spring whitlow grass, thale cress, hairy bittercress and rue

leafed saxifrage.

Garden rock cress, probably native here in spite of its name, can be seen on local walls.

There were 2 pairs of mandarin ducks on the New Dam and a single male teal. This is quite unusual though common enough elsewhere. There were 5 curlew in the field beside the Dam.

Over the last 12 months Dakin and family have planted over 4,000 trees and shrubs. These have been planted on rough ground and at the edge of fields and in corners, giving a wind break on some of the land. Not on the same scale as Picory Corner, but very good all the same.

The weather is still against us for getting on the ground. It's a good job the Joseph has a different process of muck spreading with something called an Umbilical. This is a long flexible pipe that is put on the fields and then the liquid manure is pumped out without going round the field as much as you would do with the tank.

When I was little my Dad would load the manure up with a muck fork onto the trailer, taking it onto the fields and dropping it off in heaps, then we would spread it manually on the land. Thank goodness when he finally had a muck spreader!

How things have changed in our lifetime. When we tell the grandchildren about what labour intensive work that we have done they don't believe that was how it was. It's all machines now and everything is done so much more quickly. It would take 4 or 5 days to get



the hay or silage, looking at the sky with crossed fingers hoping it wouldn't rain. Now the silage is got in a day or two.

It's nice to see that it's lambing time, as that was a job that I really enjoyed. I once went on a lambing course at Wormhill. The ewe's womb was in the form of a wooden box and the lamb was from the freezer (dead, of course). We had to get the lamb out of the womb in different forms, breach or its legs tangled up, and other various positions. After about 4 hours the lamb had defrosted and was about twice the length it was when we started! We all ate our sandwiches at the break hoping that no one had lamb in theirs. I never eat lamb because it smells just like the ewe when you are lambing.
