Youlgrave Show returns after 9-year gap

Get your prize veg, colourful blooms and kitchen delicacies at the ready – Youlgrave Show is back! The village's annual horticultural show returns this month and whether you're displaying, competing or just enjoying the array of local produce and crafts, all are welcome to attend.

The show will take place on Saturday 14th September at Youlgrave Village Hall and this year there will be a total of 83 classes covering Vegetables and Fruit, Flowers, Floral Arrangements, Baking and Preserves, Handicrafts and Children's Work.

An independent panel of judges has been lined up and there will be trophies for winners of specific categories. Public viewing will begin at 12 noon and refreshments will be available throughout the afternoon, culminating with the entertaining auction of produce to raise money for the running of the Show.

Entry cards for exhibitors are now available at Youlgrave Shop and Post Office if you want to complete them in advance (one per exhibit with your name and class). Payment of entries and display set-up will take place the evening before the Show (Friday 13th September, 6-8pm) and on the morning of the Show itself (Saturday 14th, 8-10am) at the Village Hall.

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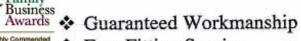





One life

Based on the book, "If It's Not Impossible...", The Life of Sir Nicholas Winton by Barbara Winton, ONE LIFE, tells the incredible, emotional true story of Nicholas 'Nicky' Winton (Flynn), a young London broker who visits Prague in December 1938. In a race against time, Winton convinces Trevor Chadwick (Sharp) and Doreen Warriner (Garai) of the British Committee for Refugees in Czechoslovakia to rescue hundreds of predominantly Jewish children before Nazi occupation closes the borders.

Fifty years later, Nicky (Hopkins) is haunted by the fate of the children he wasn't able to bring to safety in England. It's not until the BBC show, "That's Life!" re-introduces him to some of those he helped rescue that he finally begins to come to terms with the guilt and grief he carried – all the while skyrocketing Winton from anonymity to a national hero.



This month's interviewee is **Jade Stacey**, owner of Youlgrave Village Shop.



I was born at the Whitworth, Darley Dale, and I can remember going to Playschool in the Village Hall. I've still got the book I received when I left for school ('The River Bank').

Where did you go to school and what was your favourite subject?
Youlgrave All Saints and then Lady Manners. Pottery and textiles were my favourites after break time. I'm not academic at all!

What person has had the most influence over you and why? My parents, both for very different reasons.

Tell us something about you that not many people will know.

I used to teach swimming at Bakewell Pool. I have shire horses as field ornaments! I studied Childcare at Buxton College.

What do you do for a living and how did you get into it?

I own Youlgrave Village Shop. I had a moment of madness when the Binghams gave it up and thought I would give it a go. Luckily, I have Tanya or I would never have been able to do it – or still be doing it almost six years on. She is my hero!

How do you relax? With a bottle of Peroni in the bath.







What living person do you most admire and why?

Well, after Dakin Shimwell for being handsome, it would have to be my Nanny Mary. She just cracks on and hardly asks for help (which can be frustrating). I hope I'm as active as her at that age, although she can get up off the floor better than I can now.

Where's your favourite holiday destination?

What's a holiday?! I would love to go to Italy one day. It looks beautiful and for the food and drink.

What's your favourite time of the day and why?

I'm a morning person. In bed by 9 and up at 5. I love walking my dogs around 5 -5.30am when hardly anybody is around. I love the sunrise/moonlight and all the wildlife that's around at that time. I saw a kingfisher the other day. It's very peaceful and sets me up for the day.



What's your favourite food or meal? I love all food (clearly). My favourite is pasta and if I had to choose one meal it would be carbonara.

What's your favourite sport and did you ever play it? I'm not really into sport. I played netball at school. I did



get into the Olympics this time, though.

Are you a cat or a dog person? Dog. I have two, but we do have cats at the horses to keep the rats down and I really love them, especially Val.

What are you most proud of? I embarrass myself daily, usually with a bad joke, although I'm sure my friends could tell you a few stories from our nights out.

What's your most prized possession and

My animals. They get me out and provide a good way to relax and the end of the day. Nothing beats a sniff in a horse's neck. Animals are always pleased to see you - even if it's just for food.

What skill would you like to learn? I've always fancied being a butcher.

What's your favourite local view, place or location?

I love all the local views. We are so lucky

to live in such a beautiful place. My favourite would have to be where the horses are at the top of Middleton, looking down over the village (and much further).

What do you like about living in Youlgrave?

Pommie people. It's nice to drive through the village and be able to wave or pip at most people because we all know each other. We are lucky to have so many shops, pubs and a school and garage, compared to some other villages.

What could be improved about Youlgrave?

The parking, especially outside the shop. If those spaces are left free for the use of the village shops (all of them) then you can see how much better traffic moves through. Parking on the lines is a pain, but unfortunately has to be done to use the shops. And of course it helps businesses. I could go on about this all day...!



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From the Churches

We had a new vicar, John, in our church in Wakefield, when Jane and I were both teachers.

The door bell rang one day, John told us, and he opened it to find a 60-yearold man wearing rolled up jeans, sandals and no socks and wearing a donkey jacket (remember them?) and leaning on an ancient bike. John assumed it was the window cleaner and asked how much he owed. It turned out to be the bishop! Richard, the bishop, was a remarkable man. He could read a book or document and remember all the text. He was terribly 'posh' with cultured voice, absolutely 'top drawer'. He could mix with anybody, was great fun to be with, but also very challenging to all in the church who did not really want to do the things that Jesus would have us do. He was, to a degree, responsible for changing my world, and Jane's, and made the church and the faith vital and powerful.

Miss Jones was the new English teacher when I was in the third year at the grammar school. After some time she offered to take a group rock climbing. I had no interest in climbing, but did fancy a day in her company! Her fiancé, Mr Jones, had organised the day with some experienced climbers to help introduce us to 'safe' climbing. At the time my family was falling apart, my unpleasant father was in the process of leaving home. Over a period of time Margaret and Dave Jones began to get more involved in my life and became something of the family I lacked. They lent me books that were stimulating and wonderful, and took me on holiday. I spent a night a week at their house (all

terribly illegal now, of course) and we became friends, more important to me than my mother and father. My life was changed, I would say, saved, by their life shared with me.

I became a Christian when I was 16. They were shocked, because they were very confirmed atheists. It made no difference to our friendship.

Whether we are people of religious belief or not, we all face the task of changing the world. Our world and the world of others in need.

Whether you stand outside the church or inside, it is a work that we can, and should, do together.

NEWS FROM THE POMMIE PILGRIMAGE



The Pommie Pilgrims are a community pilgrim group, most of us living in the village, some from all over

country with connections to the Youlgrave. Some of us have a faith, some do not, but all of us have been making discoveries and having new experiences on our walks or on our arrival at one or another of the 42 English cathedrals, and some of those could be described as spiritual. For some, the pilgrimage marks a poignant event. Charlotte is covering Bury St Edmunds to Norwich in memory of her sister who died 5 years ago. My sister Sue is walking from St Paul's Cathedral to St Albans in memory of a dear friend who died a year ago, and in company with his widow and other friends.

For the nerds, or the factually minded: as of 22 August, 112 walkers had participated in walks to 24 cathedrals, 2,675 person-miles had been walked, representing a magnificent 6,292,460 steps walked (thank you lan for producing these stats). The funds raised online have now topped the £30,000 mark. During the summer months pilgrims have reached the cathedrals at Coventry, Blackburn, Hereford (from Worcester), Bristol, Truro, Lichfield, Birmingham,

Portsmouth, Newcastle, Sheffield, Wells and Rochester. Even Peel on the Isle of Man has been covered!

Pommie Pilgrimage – continued from p. 17

Harriet walked about 130 miles from Exeter to Truro over 8 days in July, solo and mostly tent camping, carrying a 13 kg pack. Her route took her across the north side of Dartmoor, then followed the Coastal Path along the south coast of Cornwall. Harriet says: "Two things I learned on pilgrimage: churches recharge more than one type of battery, and always partake in first breakfast, second breakfast, elevenses, luncheon, afternoon tea, dinner and supper."

Billy, aged 16, walked the Hadrian's Wall Path from Carlisle to Newcastle, a distance of 70 miles over 4 days, solo but with discreet support from his family. Billy's cool-as-a-cucumber and matter-of-fact attitude, as well as his stamina, are admirable.

Lots more walks are planned for September and a few for October, and we are thrilled that walks to all 42 English cathedrals are planned or

already in progress. We kicked off in March with a mass walk from Youlgrave to Derby Cathedral over 3 days. We want to round off the main walking season with a similar walk from Sheffield Cathedral back to Youlgrave, over the 3 days Friday 27 to Sunday 29 September. We plan to set out from the cathedral on Friday afternoon and walk to a pub on the fringes of Sheffield. Saturday's longer walk will take us down the Edges as far as Baslow or Edensor, and Sunday's goes via Chatsworth and Haddon Hall to Youlgrave, where drinks, cake and Evensong will await us. Finally, please 'save the date' for Sunday 3 November, when we are planning an all-age All Saints Day celebration service with visual aids. In churchy terms, this will be our patronal festival.

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
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Update from Derbyshire Dales District Councillor (Youlgrave ward), Laura Mellstrom

The District Council is back in business after the general election quiet period, and has launched Year 2 of the Progressive Alliance administration with a Nature Delivery Plan and 2 public consultations.

Nature Delivery Plan:

All local authorities now have a 'biodiversity duty' to not only conserve but to enhance biodiversity. The District Council has approved a plan aimed at becoming leaders in championing nature conservation and enhancement. It covers 5 areas: Council services, the Planning system, Flooding, Agriculture and Ecotourism. You can read the full plan here:

Car Park review consultation (closes 18 September):

The Council runs 40 car parks across the district, all of which now offer payment on the PaybyPhone App or by a telephone call. Payment methods are not part of this consultation, which is focused mainly on the issue of differential charging rates, facilities for disabled drivers and motorhomes, and whether there should be a free 30 minute option.

Traveller sites consultation - closes 22 September 2024

The search is ongoing for suitable land to build permanent Gypsy & Traveller sites. Unusually, Derbyshire Dales has no such designated facilities, and external agents have been commissioned for this search. In the meantime, two Gypsy families with connections to the area are currently situated on car parks in Matlock Bath and Matlock Station, and have been stuck there for several years now. The Council is therefore looking to identify alternative temporary options on land which the Council already owns, in 6 possible locations. Holiday lets:

The previous government floated the idea of changing the planning laws to make holiday lets a separate 'Use Class' from normal homes, so that local authorities can use the Planning permission system to control the numbers of holiday lets. That proposal didn't make it into the Levelling Up & Regeneration Act, so the Council has voted to write to the Deputy Prime Minister urging her to introduce the necessary legislation without further delay, and will be urging the Peak Park and other local authorities to do the same.

Youlgrave Wildlife Notes: July & August 2024

The weather has continued to be very variable and not very summery. This has particularly affected butterfly numbers which seem to be well down this year. Large whites, heading for the cabbages, are fairly common at the moment and I have seen peacock, gatekeeper and comma recently but numbers are low. Cinnabar moth caterpillars have stripped the ragworts near Hollow Farm and the adult moths have been spotted.

Some other very interesting insects have been reported. Photos of a hornet mimic hover fly and a red listed (endangered) necklace ground beetle were sent in. Some very large spiders have been invading a house down Alport Lane.

As for mammals, black fallow deer have been seen near Raper Bridge, Hawley's Bridge and towards the Via Gellia. A hedgehog has been a frequent visitor in Alport and droppings have been found on lawns. There

have been several sightings of hares.

Twelve people came on the village Swift Walk on the 2nd July. There were very few swifts to be seen, but we did identify around 20 nests. Some of the sites were new to me. Towards the end of the evening swifts were seen visiting their nests. The swifts left us in the first week of August. The best count was over 20 in the air. House martins seem to have had some success. More than 60 were seen at Alport recently, though about 20 sitting on overhead wires

seems more typical. Perching swallows were in similar numbers and there have been flocks of both birds over the New Dam recently.

Birds of prey have been well reported. Apart from our usual buzzards, kites have been seen regularly, peregrines occasionally and sparrowhawks have been made several kills in local gardens. We watched one from our kitchen window, dissecting a collared dove. A

barn owl has been seen once again hunting between Alport Lane and Raper Lane. heron has been fishing at the New dam and there have been plenty of mallard and mandarin ducks. I counted over 60 greylag geese there. A warbler sedae redstarts have been seen near the Dam.

On the river there have been lots of young ducks, moorhens and coots, the occasional heron and even a kingfisher. Dippers have been establishing territories. The swan has apparently moved to the

apparently moved to the Lathkill. In the gardens jays and woodpeckers have been big consumers of bird food. We have lots of blackbirds and young robins have been getting their red breasts. Several families of blue tits have visited, but there seems to be a

On my monthly wildlife walk on the 24th I found 65 species of wildflower in bloom. Many were at the end of their season, but rosebay and great willowherbs were very colourful below the playing field and there were lots of

shortage of goldcrests and other finches.

mints and both fools and normal water cress in the river. I saw a kingfisher on the third dam. My final orchid count on our lawn was 19. Some of the older ones didn't bloom this year, but there were several new groups. Knapweeds have appeared for the first time.



Recipe of the month: Pear Treat

With lots of fruit on the trees at the moment here's a Pear Treat.

Ingredients

3 ripe pears peeled and cored 200g SR flour 75g light brown sugar 3 ball of stem ginger form a jar chopped into small pieces, plus 2tbsp of the syrup 150ml whole milk 1 large egg 100g butter melted lcing sugar for dusting.

FOR THE TOFFEE SAUCE
150g light brown sugar
100g butter
100ml crème fraiche
3tbsp syrup from the jar
You will also need a 1ltre shallow sided ovenproof dish.

Method

Preheat the oven to 180 (160 gas)
Make the sauce by heating all the ingredients together in a pan until all the sugar has dissolved, pour 150ml of

the sauce into the ovenproof dish.

Cut each pear into eighths, sift the flour into a bowl add the sugar and ginger pieces. Whisk together the milk, eggs, syrup and butter, add to the flour all but 6 pieces of the pear. Spoon into the dish and arrange the remaining pears on top,

Place into the oven on a baking sheet for about 45 mins,

Reheat the rest of the sauce and lightly dust the cooked pudding with the icing sugar.

Serve with the warm sauce, it is also nice with ice cream.
