A busy time for Youlgrave School

It's certainly a very happy new year at our village school! The children have returned from the break full of enthusiasm and are very engaged in their learning. There have already been some amazing activities going on.

In Class 2, our young scientists have been diving into the exciting world of States of Matter. They have been exploring solids, liquids, and gases through hands-on experiments and asking lots of questions. The biggest hit? Oobleck. This magical substance had everyone amazed as it acted like both a solid and a liquid – what a mystery! The children loved squishing, poking, and testing its strange properties while discovering how science can be full of surprises. Their enthusiasm and laughter filled the classroom as they learned through play and exploration.

We welcomed PCSO Boswell into school to talk about the role of the Police; and to everyone's delight were

able to see a demonstration of the Police dogs and their handler at work in the playground. It was such a fantastic opportunity to see up close the level of skill and training involved. Again, the children asked lots of great questions and showed a great deal of curiosity. This session is part of a year-long programme designed to increase the children's knowledge and understanding of personal safety, as well as how the police work in the community. It is such an important relationship for school.

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

Youlgrave Waterworks saw consumption rise at Christmas, but the cold spell since then has seen even more water used rather than the expected fall, which means there are leaks on the system. Two have been identified for a property and an outbuilding, so please be extra vigilant and assist us by listening out for unusual noises and signs of running water that may indicate a burst pipe. Please check outhouses, sheds and other buildings that are not regularly used; and if leaving the

property unattended at this time of year please turn off the water. Our team will be doing late night checks around the village this month, as it's the best time when there is little usage to see and hear and check flow but your assistance is essential to help find any problems.

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
Are you good at numbers?

New affordable housing on Hannah Bowman Way given the go-ahead

The Peak District National Park Authority has given planning permission for the proposed scheme of nine new affordable homes for rent off Hannah Bowman Way, Youlgrave. It follows an earlier development of eight homes completed in Spring 2015.

The new scheme received unanimous approval by the Authority's December Planning Committee and will include one 2-bed bungalow, two ground floor 1-bed flats for older/less mobile people, two first floor 1-bed flats for younger people, two 2-bed houses and two 3-bed houses. They will all be for rent and all will have a strict 10-year legal clause attached to them, which means you will need to have had a minimum 10-year

connection to the village in order to be eligible.

The scheme was put forward Youlgrave Community Land Trust (YCLT), in association with East Midlands Housing Association (who will build the houses) and Peak District Rural Housing Association, a Registered Provider, who will manage and maintain the homes.

YCLT insisted that a local architect was used in order to influence decisions about the kind of build envisaged and to ensure it felt and looked right for the village.

In particular, YCLT wanted the same high-quality build as the earlier Hannah Bowman Way development, so the new homes will be constructed in natural local limestone with roofs of

Staffordshire Blue clay tiles, matching the buildings on Hannah Bowman Way. They, too, will all have solar panels, top insulation and water saving fixtures; and they will meet the new and higher environmental standards required for heating.

As requested by existing Hannah Bowman Way residents, YCLT wanted some vegetable plots, safe places for the children to play, reconfiguration of the rooms downstairs so that parents are better able to oversee on-line activity, and have office, hobby or snug space. They were also keen to fulfil the higher requirements for improving the biodiversity of the site through landscaping, wild areas and tree planting.



It is hoped work will begin in June/July 2026 for completion in Autumn 2027.

Peak Cluster consultation

Peak Cluster is a large scale carbon capture and storage ("CCS") project which is running a public consultation from 12 January to 27 February. The plan is to drastically reduce the carbon emissions from the cement and lime industries in Derbyshire and Staffordshire by capturing the CO₂ during the production process, and then piping it across country to permanent storage underground in porous rocks under the Irish Sea at a site called Morecambe Net Zero.

This involves the construction of an underground pipeline from Hope Valley Cement Works to the Wirral via Tarmac Tunstead Cement Works, Buxton Lime, Holcim Cauldon Cement Works, and then across Cheshire to the west coast. It is intended that the project will be operational by 2032, but it is still very much in the planning stage and the precise route is not yet finalised.

Cement production contributes about 8% of global CO₂ emissions, which cannot be eliminated by switching to renewable energy because the CO₂ is released by the production process itself, not just by burning fossil fuels to power the plants. CCS is claimed to be the only way to make the cement industry sustainable but critics argue that it's expensive untested technology, quite apart from the environmental damage and carbon emissions involved in the construction of the pipeline and above-ground facilities.

The cost of the project is also unclear. When asked at a recent councillor briefing about the cost to the public purse, the answer was "there are no cheap and simple solutions...". We were told that making the industries pay would render them uncompetitive, so that "a level of public support" is

Local Government Funding

According to the Rural Services Network, people in rural areas pay on average about 20% more per head in council tax than urban residents. The annual council tax budget process is underway again at DDDC and it is likely that it will go up again by the maximum 2.99% as far as the District Council's portion is concerned. Despite early promises to the contrary, it seems the County Council will be also be seeking an increase in their share, which is collected by the District Council through the council tax bills and passed on to DCC.

Part of the problem is the reduction in recent years in the amount of money coming from central government. Following the Fair Funding Review, the available grants have been merged, with the focus now being on increased provision for areas of urban deprivation. There is no longer any additional help for rural councils facing extra costs of providing services to remote areas, so although some areas are getting a funding boost, Derbyshire Dales will be worse off.

The Rural Services Network is advising people to ask their MP to raise questions with Ministers over the Government's evidence on the additional costs of service delivery in rural areas ('the cost of remoteness') and how the new funding formula has been arrived at. 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
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

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From the Churches

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Youlgrave Wildlife Notes: December 2025 & January 2026

These winter months have welcomed some interesting visitors. Two winter thrushes, redwing and fieldfare, have been widely reported in large flocks round the village, sometimes in mixed flocks with other thrushes and blackbirds. A lot of our winter blackbirds are migrants and often have black instead of yellow beaks. We have had a lot of geese around the

New Dam, mainly greylags but on Christmas day two Siberian white fronted geese joined them. This was a rare treat. There was a single male wigeon on the New Dam on the 18th of January. Our big fish eating duck, the goosander, has been an occasional visitor mainly to the New Dam. Kingfishers have often been seen particularly near Alport.

Our smallest British bird, the goldcrest, has been quite common, often right down by the river, but also in gardens. Stonechats have been regulars on the fence by the stream coming from the New Dam. A little egret has been seen occasionally both by the New Dam and higher up the river; and a dabchick has been seen on the river. Grey wagtails have been seen, but less frequently than usual. Dippers have been rather scarce recently, but I did see one right up below the Middleton track. Less common birds on garden feeders have

been greater spotted woodpeckers, nuthatches and long tailed tits. Goldfinches, greenfinches and chaffinches are frequent visitors to our garden, along with the usual dunnocks, wrens, blue great and coal tits.

Red kites were often seen, particularly in December, and buzzards are common with the occasional kestrel. A little further from home, on Haddon Fields, large flocks of lapwings have been reported. I recently got round to checking and cleaning my garden nest boxes. All three boxes had tit nests in them. I am pleased to report that our local swift team have identified 76 swift nests around Youlgrave. Unlike house martins, which are very messy, swifts make no mess at all and as they seldom visit the nests are often unreported, so a brilliant effort here.

Roe deer have been reported in Roughwood Hollow. A small white animal with some black on it was seen

near Robin Hood's Stride. Could this have been a white stoat, otherwise called an ermine? I did see one once in Lathkill Dale many years ago.

The recent frost and snow seem to have totally finished our wild flowers. However, there are a few garden snowdrops blooming and on Christmas Eve there were still harebells blooming on Brookleton. My biggest hope for spring so far has been some ripe hazel catkins shedding pollen onto the tiny red female flowers that will become hazel nuts later in the year.

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Church Farm Diary, February

I hope everyone had a nice Christmas and New Year, hopefully 2026 will be good to us.

Apart for a few days frost, the weather has been kind to us. When it's very frosty it causes a lot of extra work when the water has frozen and you have to cart water to the animals. It's surprising how much water a beast can drink, as no water = no milk.

Looking through some old photos the other day, I came across some of my grandfather Arthur Wardle. He apparently had the first taxi service in the village. He used white horses for weddings and black for funerals, then when motor cars came along he bought his car. I also have copies of his driving licences; the copies are from 1925 to 1927. Grandad Arthur died in his 40s, leaving my Nanan with four small children. They lived in the cottage that is in the George Hotel car park. Some of you may remember my Uncle Charlie who was a plumber, then my dad Harold who went to live with his Uncle Tom at Church Farm? Auntie Marie and Auntie Dorothy were both well known in the village.

With Rowsley train station and Bakewell both active, I expect he was very busy transporting customers to catch their trains and be picked up; and before the car he would take the milk in churns to the station. Michael says that his father from Old Hall Farm used to take their milk in churns with the horse and cart to the station like many other farmers did in the area. I bet my grandfather would be appalled by the amount of traffic that goes through the village now!

Community tree packs

The Woodland Trust is offering free tree saplings to community groups, including not-for-profit community groups, resident associations, sports clubs, local councils, faith groups, Scouts and Guides.

Applications are open from now until August for delivery of saplings in November 2026 so there is some time to plan.

The free packs of saplings on offer contain 15, 30, 105 or 420 saplings and are tailored to suit a variety of different purposes and locations. Each applicant can request up to four packs as long as the total number of saplings does not exceed 420. Each tree is 20-60cm tall, making them easy to transport, handle and plant.

Recipe of the month: Asian style fish parcels

Ingredients

4 spring onions
1 small carrot
4 small pak choi
4 pieces of skinned cod or fillet about 7oz
2 tsp oil for brushing
4 tsp dark soy sauce
Salt and freshly ground pepper
1 fresh mild red chilli deseeded and thinly sliced lengthways
1 tsp rice wine or white wine
2 tsp finely grated root ginger
2 garlic cloves
½ tsp caster sugar

Method

Preheat the oven to 230 fan or gas 8. Slice the spring onions and slice the carrot into match stick pieces, cut the pak choi in to 4.

Pat the fish dry and set aside.

To make the parcels cut four 12in squares of parchment paper lined foil, lay them foil side down and brush with a little oil. In the centre of each paper lay the cut vegetables and then the fish, salt and pepper and a little oil.

In a bowl mix the remaining soy sauce with the wine ginger and garlic sugar and 2 teaspoons of cold water, spoon over the fish and parcel up the parchment, seal tightly.

Put the parcels on a baking tray and cook for about 15 mins, depending on the thickness of the fish.

Be careful when opening the parcels as they get very hot. Serve with rice.
